Tinkle, Tinkle, Little Star

Urinetown may be an unusual idea for a musical, but it's certainly not alone.

You can just imagine the conversation that must have happened at some point between producer and playwright: "So, what's your show about?"

"Uh, peeing."

"What, are you kidding me?"

"No, it's a musical."

"What, are you kidding me?"

Sorry, we're not. Having the privilege to pee is exactly what Urinetown: The Musical is about. Oh, it covers a lot more than that, of course. Just as Jonathan Larson did with Rent, Urinetown creators Mark Hollmann and Greg Kotis made sure their show was also about the ever-widening gap between rich and poor, the importance of standing up for your ideals, and the simple, elegant beauty of pairing snappy songs with laugh-out-loud lyrics. And, as a two-time Tony Award winner (Best Book, Best Original Score, 2002), Urinetown is also all about how theatrical success can still be achieved by taking artistic risks. Rather than follow the usual

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Musical Success Formula of building a show around a pre-existing idea-be it a book (Jane Eyre), movie (Kiss of the Spider Woman), another musical (The Wiz) or all of the above (Chitty Chitty Bang Bang)-one of the things that makes Urinetown so good, so memorable, is its stark originality.

Now, I'm into musicals like some guys are into hockey cards, but for the life of me, I can't think of any other show that revolves around the societal ramifications of the elimination of bodily wastes. Sex? Easy. (Oh! Calcutta!, Sex: The Musical.) Drugs? No problem. (Hair, Rent.) Religion? Piece of cake. (Yentl, Godspell.) Transsexuals? Oh, please. (Hedwig and the Angry Inch, The Rocky Horror Picture Show, Priscilla, Queen of the Desert . . . hey, why do all the cross-dressing musicals have such long names?)

But peeing? Sorry, I don't think that's why the surrey needed a fringe on top. ("You better put up the top, Curly. It's rainin'." "Sorry, Miss Laurie. That ain't rain.") Somewhere, Rogers and Hammerstein are spinning in their grave . . . and Stephen Sondheim is busting a gut.

Not that Urinetown is alone in the odd musicals department. Indeed, that often seems to be the whole point with the more successful musicals of late. Consider something as seemingly innocent as Avenue Q, 2004's triple Tony winner that featured a charming collection of tunes praising internet porn and everyday racism, and had characters singing about-and during-puppet sex. Or William Finn's Falsettoland trilogy, which includes happy little ditties like "Four Jews in a Room Bitching" and "My Father's a Homo." Or Hedwig . . . don't even get me started on Hedwig. And can anything top the tacky classic "Springtime for Hitler" from The Producers? ("Don't be stupid, be a smartie, come and join the Nazi party.") I think not.

But don't work under the illusion that this is only an American thing; Canadian musicals can be just as outrageous. Angry Housewives and Menopositive may be well-known here on the west coast, but there's also the tasty maple likes of Dads in Bondage, The Return Of The Curse Of The Mummy's Revenge and that national classic, My Fur Lady. And let's not forget such local offerings as The Sound of Rat, a hip-hop spoof of that most mainstream of musicals. (Regardless of how it did at the box office, The Sound of Rat will forever live in my memory as one of the oddest musicals I've ever had the twisted pleasure of seeing.) Of course, had I attended the recent Bad Musicals Festival in New York City, I could have run, not walked, away from Tamponville.

See? Urinetown's influence is already spreading.

There is, however, a serious side to Urinetown. After making its debut in the 1999 New York International Fringe Festival ("a last resort for us," notes creators Hollman and Kotis) and following an Off-Broadway remount in May, 2001, Urinetown was set for its official Broadway opening on Thursday, September 13-with a press preview lined up for Tuesday, September 11. That's September 11, 2001 . . . the one night when all of Broadway got closed down. Things looked grim for our plucky heroes (indeed, you could probably describe them as being quite pissed off). Then, a miracle-Mayor Rudolph Giuliani decides the shows must go on and, as scheduled, two days after the Twin Towers attacks, Urinetown brings some much-needed laughs to a city under siege. Eight months later, it picks up a whopping 10 Tony nominations

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and eventually makes it way here to Victoria, a city that has strong opinions about public urination and the elimination of bodily wastes. (Sorry Mr. Floatie, you'll have to wait for your own musical about Number Two.)

Subject matter and production history aside, Urinetown is also a great example of why musicals are still incredibly relevant-and necessary. Not counting multi-million-dollar touring extravaganzas like Phantom, Miss Saigon and Les Mis, how often do you get to see a small professional show that features a cast of 15, an on-stage orchestra of four and off-stage employment for close to two dozen others? For anyone trying to make a living in theatre, Urinetown is a dream come true-on so many different levels. Not only is it a fresh, funny and full-on musical challenge, but it's also incredibly successful and can offer jobs for a lot of people. And in the stage game, my friends, that is just as important as having the privilege to pee.

"What, are you kidding me?"

Nope, we're not.





e) Preview: Climate Change at UVic

Frustrated by the unbearably slow action on climate change while the world... uhh... burns? So are we. As a preview of UVSP work to come here's some info on what's been happening in the campus sustainability movement as it rallies around perhaps the greatest challenge facing our generation.

The agenda of the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education conference was mobilizing the professional campus sustainability movement around climate change as the crystallizing focus. In particular, inspired by the campaign that got 200 U.S. mayors to commit their cities to meeting Kyoto targets they have started a campaign to get 200 university presidents to make a big climate change commitment. UVic?s Dave Turpin has been asked to attend the meeting in late November - we?ll keep you posted on developments.

More exciting than this is the work of the Campus Climate Challenge - the joint-project of more than 25 youth organizations in Canada and the US. They are providing the resources and the impetus to get students organizing for 100% clean energy policies at their schools. They have already established groups at 330 campuses. Here's a recent press release showing some victories: http://climatechallenge.org/documents/Challenge-Media Advisory 5.31.06.pdf

There is also the Canadian Youth Climate Coalition that is organizing to resist federal policy. They've organized a declaration which you can see here: http://ourclimate.ca/?page_id=25 -- Given the unbelievably mediocre Clean Air legislation coming from the Conservatives I guarantee we will see more of this.

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UC Berkeley has shown us a great example of what can be done. After hard campaigning on the part of students they have committed to 80% reductions by 2050 with an excellent structure for doing so. They have formed a committee that crosses disciplines, bridges faculty and staff, includes students, and reaches out to local NGOs and municipalities. For the next two years this committee will be putting together a feasibility study and with that foundation implementation of a comprehensive, local, and innovative plan will be off to a good start.

So - what could happen at UVic? Well for now let's just say: LOTS. After all, universities are some of the few institutions that can go beyond carbon neutral (paying to offset the emissions that remain after efficiency improvements) by using the local knowledge and planning decisions to actually reduce the GHG emissions of their entire region. Going beyond climate neutral is what we desperately need if we're going to make the small window of opportunity to deal with climate change.

She will also be attending the African Youth Initiative on Climate Change conference from November 3-5th. Naomi will help guarantee a Canadian youth presence at the UN climate negotiations, build capacity amongst African youth to act on climate issues and increase youth capacity to

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engage in the international climate policy process, as well as work to secure a permanent youth constituency at the UNFCCC (United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change).

The delegation has not been able to fundraise that much money, leaving delegates to do this themselves. With the cost of the flight (\$2000), immunizations (\$500), insurance (\$200), accommodations (\$240), carbon offsets (\$100), and food (\$200), she has about \$3240 to raise and needs your help. Background:

Over the past year, Canada's leadership role in the fight against climate change has been drastically diminished. The federal government has become increasingly reticent on this critical issue, demonstrated in both its domestic policies and distain for international commitments. In response to this leadership gap, youth from across Canada gathered in Toronto on September 8th to 10th at a summit that brought together representatives from over 45 businesses, labour and environmental organizations. The Canadian Youth Climate Coalition was born out of the summit.
