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Lack of Childcare Program in Canada Points to Sexism:

Mothers and Childcare workers vow to march for childcare on Mother?s Day

(Vancouver, Canada) ? Pointing to the decades of unfulfilled promises for a national childcare program in Canada, Grassroots Women asserts that it is the result of sexism in the Canadian government. To bring this issue to light, the organization will host a Mother?s Day March and Rally on May 8 under the banner ?Universal Childcare is a Women?s Right!?

?Childcare is a working class women?s issue,? explains Marlee Oulett, amother and an organizer with Grassroots Women. ?We are overwhelmingly the ones taking care of our kids at home and those working in the childcare field.?

Studies have found that Canadian women still have the primary responsibility for childcare: in one study, over 75% of women stated they had the primary responsibility for arranging childcare and were four times more likely tostay home with a sick child than men in the study. Women also account for over 97% of those providing childcare in the public and private sectors.

?The lack of action to implement a childcare program points to a lack of genuine respect for advancing women?s equality,? asserts Rachel Rosen, childcare worker and organizer with Grassroots Women. ?The lack of universal childcare contributes to stalling working class women?s development and trapping us in poverty.?

?Because I didn?t qualify for a full subsidy, I had to pay for childcarewhen I make little more than welfare rates working in factory. Most of my income went to childcare. It?s impossible to advance my education or save for our future,? continues Marlee, mother of three children under 12. ?When I was doing seasonal work, it was the hardest. Sometimes we had to work for 25 days straight and we?d lose our jobs if we didn?t do all the shifts: try finding and affording childcare for 25 days in a row, 12 hours per day!?

While the federal government continues to speak about implementing anational childcare system, they have yet to put any guarantees in place to ensure that it will be directly towards a public, not-for-profit system or that the exploitative and defacto Canadian childcare program? the Live-in Caregiver

Progam ? will be scrapped. ?Since childcare programs fall under provincial jurisdiction, we need more than just a cash infusion to the provinces. InBC, we have seen increased federal funding in the past few years, yet for

mothers and childcare workers there is now even less access to quality childcare.

Childcare should not be a tug of war but a basic right for women and our families!? continues Rosen.

The Mother?s Day March and Rally will begin at 2:00pm on May 8 at WoodlandPark (Adanac and Woodland). Protesters will march to Grandview Park (Commercial and Charles) for a program of speakers, performers and children?s activities. Everyone is welcome to join together under the call: ?Universal childcare is a women?s

COPE SCHOOL TRUSTEES PROTECT STUDENTS AT BC SCHOOL TRUSTEES MEETING. Vancouver COPE School Trustees Adrienne Montani, Noel Herron, Angela Kenyon, Allan Wong, and Jane Bouey worked with trustees from across BC to pass important motions at last month's BC School Trustees Annual General Meeting in Victoria. COPE Trustees used resolutions and a question period with the BC Liberal's Minister of Education, to demand adequate funding, oppose privatization of public education and defend publicly elected school boards.

The most significant Vancouver motion on lesbian, gay, bisexual, and trans-identified youth

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passed by a large majority. The motion states: "That the BCSTA encourage and support school district policies that specifically address the safety concerns of, and prohibit discrimination against, lesbian, gay, bisexual, and trans-identified students, as well as students who are harassed due to perceptions of their gender identity or sexual orientation.."

Also passing with near unanimous support was a Vancouver motion calling on the "Minister of Education to provide funding to school boards to support universal access to All-Day Kindergarten."

And near unanimous support was given to a resolution calling on the Ministry "to provide necessary funding to complete seismic upgrades of all identified at-risk schools within 10 years, with the highest priority being upgrades within 3 - 5 years for all schools assessed as being at high risk."

Vancouver Trustees also ensured that BCSTA policy continues to call for "raising welfare rates to at least the minimum poverty line."

Vancouver motions that did not pass included a resolution on the elimination of the new provincial Grade 10 exams. COPE Trustees noted that there is no evidence that standardized Grade 10 exams improves learning, and the exams could narrow curriculum to the exams, and download more work on teachers.

Vancouver's lone NPA Trustee supported Grade 10 exams.

#### VANCOUVER PARK BOARD OPTS FOR FAIR-TRADED PRODUCTS

Mar 28, 2005 - COPE Park Commissioners have approved an ethical purchasing policy for products sold in Vancouver park concessions.

Vancouver Park Board was following on City Council's earlier decision to pass an ethical purchasing policy that requires suppliers to follow a sustainability code that ensures workers who make products that are used or sold by the City and Park Board are protected by accepted health and safety standards.

Commissioner Lyndsay Poaps and her fellow COPE Commissioners pushed hard to get ethical purchasing in public parks.

"It is important for the parks board to be on board," said Poaps. "We are the city's principal buyer through golf courses and food revenues. Over a year we get, on average, \$400,000 in revenue from the 15 park concession stands and the three golf course clubhouses."

The Vancouver Park Board spends about \$1.5 million purchasing foodstuffs and other supplies.

# DRAFT COPE SCHOOL BOARD BUDGET - NO LAY-OFFS, SMALLER CLASSES, FOCUS ON LEARNING

The Vancouver School Board has issued its first draft of the 2005-06 budget. Using public input received over two years of consultations, and working with an addition of \$6.8 million in funds, COPE Trustees are ensuring no lay-offs this year. They also want to decrease class-sizes in intermediate grades, increasing the number of teacher-librarians, and assign more staff to ESL and special needs. The Board is proposing All Day Kindergarten for Vancouver's twelve inner city schools. Other areas proposed for renewed support include: clerical, school administration,

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fine arts, mini-schools, teacher development, technology and library resources.

#### THE VANCOUVER POUND

KILLING HEALTHY DOGS IN A NO-KILL PUBLIC FACILITY

April 9, 2005. The Vancouver Animal Shelter, formerly know as the Vancouver

Imagine the shock of horrified no-kill activists when they discovered city

Pound, is a city-run and taxpayer funded facility which bills itself as Canada's 1st No-Kill Shelter on its website. The staff and volunteers who

work and volunteer their time there do so in large part because of the shelter's commitment to a no-kill policy. Fundraising letters and appealsalways mention the no-kill status of the shelter.

employees quietly bringing drugged animals into an after-hours veterinary clinic in Vancouver to have them killed. When the activists started asking questions about the animals, the city staff refused to answer, calling on a supervisor and quickly removing the dogs from sight. The activists, one aformer politician who had voted for increased funding for the shelter based on the no-kill policy, the other a prominent campaigner for no-kill

shelters and humane bylaws in the lower mainland, were then ejected from the clinic at 41st and Fraser by the owner of the clinic who tried to make arrangements to have the dogs killed at another time and place. Both activists waited on the sidewalk for the city employee in charge to exit, Ms. Katy Ernst, who spoke briefly with them but refused to answer most of their questions pertaining to the dogs. She did say that the dogs were not

ordered destroyed by a court, and that one of the dogs was alleged to have

bitten the former owner, although this was not corroborated by physical ormedical evidence.

Nor was Ernst able to confirm whether or not the dogs had

been properly evaluated by an animal behaviourist for treatment ofbehavioural problems caused by abuse and trauma.

Both activists offered to locate qualified dog trainers (in securefacilities if need be) and pay for the treatment of any behavioural

problems the Vancouver Animal Shelter staff were unequipped or unwilling todeal with. This offer was refused at the time by Ms. Ernst, but remains

open. Earnst also refused to reveal who order the dogs killed, and the

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shelter manager Nancy Clay, who is also a dog breeder, was unavailable at the time. Bob Christofoli her assistant, was not at work that day either. Attempts to contact shelter staff and managerial staff at the shelter to discover the current status of the dogs and investigate how such anincident should come to pass have been unsuccessful at this point.

City Councilor Tim Louis expressed outrage at the situation and plans to investigate the matter. Said Louis I am strongly opposed to euthanasia of animals and called placement of special needs dogs needing rehabilitation in the community with qualified volunteers a practical solution to the problem. Louis is on the Finance Committee, which oversees funding to the shelter.

Financial and managerial oversight of the facility clearly needs to be reviewed, as Freedom of Information requests by Animal Rights Coalition spokesperson Donna Liberson which advocates for no-kill shelters reveal that city staff had been systematically destroying legal records of animals which the Animal Rights Coalition had inquired about. Their fate is not known, and in a public facility, this lack of accountability and transparency is both unacceptable and shocking. Liberson comments: "We also discovered veterinary bills paid for by the City of Vancouver for animals that were not Vancouver Pound animals. A forensic audit of the pound mustbe done."

Former Park Commissioner Roslyn Cassells received numerous calls from volunteers and staffers at the shelter reporting concerns that they knew or suspected that animals were being killed away from the public eye. This has now been clearly evidenced with a number of witnesses to this incident. Furthermore she received calls about animal research done on shelter dogs by UBC researchers studying the effect of social and physical deprivation on dogs. Some of the dogs in the study who were in the deprived group had such declines in their overall health that they moved from being considered adoptable to unadoptable. The debate over the ethics of using seized and lost dogs, who could easily be someone's pet gone missing, in a long study which could adversely effect their health went unspoken as staff and volunteers asking questions or questioning the study were strongly discouraged. Eventually the dogs in the study, which was never reviewed at city council, were moved to a locked area in the facility where only specific staff and researchers were permitted. Other staffers and volunteers who had previously been regularly visiting and exercising the dogs were forbidden to do so. During the period of the study the animals were removed from the possibility of adoption and were used only as research subjects for the UBC study. A number of dogs was released informally to UBC researchers. What was the fate of those animals? Cassells commented When I was an elected representative on the park board from 1999-2002 I received a lot of complaints from members of the public that the pound was not doing enough bylaw enforcement. When I asked pound officials about this they said they needed more money for enforcement. I voted in favor of large budget increases to the pound to increase bylaw

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enforcement in the park system and improve animal welfare. However, despite huge infusions of cash and significant infrastructure improvements to the physical plant and the level of staffing, the complaints increased. I am concerned about how the money is being used at this facility. I am concerned about the fact that the animals do not receive basic preventativevaccinations and their veterinary care seems inadequate. Where did all the money go that was meant to help the animals? Why is the public being asked to donate money to this facility under the guise of a no-kill shelter when the shelter is clearly killing animals and even using them as research subjects. A homeless animal needs advocacy, not exploitation. A strong light needs to be shone on the Vancouver Animal Shelter at this time. The City of Vancouver needs to decide if they are willing to go to bat for homeless animals or not. They are truly the most voiceless and powerless members of our community. If we are truly civilized we must oppose any attempts to abuse, kill, or use these living creatures in any way whichgoes against their nature.

#### 22. ASSESSING THE IMPACT OF INCOME ASSISTANCE POLICY

I am a University of Victoria School of Social Work practicum student at the Constituency office of Jenny Kwan and I am currently developing a report on single parents and income assistance - specifically the rule that moves single parents off of income assistance and into the workforce when their youngest child is 3. I am doing a 4-fold survey to look at how this rule is impacting the women, their children and the community. I have surveys designed for:

- women who have children under 3,
- women whose youngest is over 3
- organizations who work primarily with low income and/or parenting women (such as job preparatory programs for parenting women)
- organizations who have a wide clientele base which includes low income parenting women (such as food banks & daycares).

I am asking for assistance from organizations that are willing to fill out organization based surveys and/or distribute surveys to program participants who may be impacted by the rule to move single mothers off of income assistance. When finished this report will be submitted to the Opposition Research to help guide policy with regards to this rule. And I will make copies of a summary of the report available to organizations that have assisted in its completion.
